TAMARIND OF MAYFAIR

Ensconced in one of London's smartest districts, Tamarind opened its doors 30 years ago. It was one of the first Indian restaurants to earn a Michelin star'— and it still holds this distinction today.

To celebrate the milestone, the restaurant has launched a 50-cover, year-round terrace, designed by Stephanie Barba Mendoza, the creative mind behind the redesign of Annabel's on nearby Berkeley Square. In warmer months, the terrace is shaded

Among the standout small plates, the Rajasthani uri chaat – a popular Indian street food – impressed with its satisfying crunch and tange ychuneys. The comout and chill isee bass, served with a salmon roe salss, was complex and delectable. The main attraction was slow-cooked Mangalorean prawn curry, accompanied by fresh naan and rice.
